## Let's Teach like

I **LIKE** it. I no (don't) **LIKE** it. These are two sentences you may hear from children who are learning to comment about their environment.

The ability to share your opinion about something is very important, and the word "LIKE" is a great way to introduce that concept. Of course, LIKE does carry other meanings. As a noun, it is something you enjoy. As a preposition, it is used for comparisons.

Using aided language input, explain that **LIKE** means "to enjoy." It may be easier to explain it in a sentence:

"If you **LIKE** something it makes you feel happy."

"If you **LIKE** something it means you want more."

"If you **LIKE** something it means it's your favorite."



Model the word throughout the day, touching **LIKE** in the vocabulary anytime you say it.

"I LIKE that."

"Do you **LIKE** it?"

"I don't **LIKE** that noise."

"I don't LIKE the sound of that."

"I LIKE how you are waiting."

"That looks **LIKE** mine."

"It looks **LIKE** it might rain."



Create activities to provide lots of models and practice with LIKE.

Book: "Green Eggs & Ham."

Song: "I **LIKE** to Move It."

Snack/Meal: Have a taste testing to determine what they **LIKE**.

Activity: Go to an art gallery & comment about what you LIKE and don't LIKE



Create opportunities for the learner to say **LIKE**. Make sure to wait and look at them so they know it is expected.

Ask "What did you think about that?" Look and wait expectantly or provide choices "Did you **LIKE** it, or not **LIKE** it?"
